From the Desk of Professor & Chair

We in the TCOM Dept. of Pediatrics and Women's Health (PWH) are excited that 2020 is nearing its conclusion and that Winter Break and a New Year are approaching. This 50th anniversary of TCOM has been far different than expected due to the COVID-19 pandemic which has been steadily intensifying in recent weeks. Recent hopeful news has been the prospect for effective vaccines to become available in 2021. In the meantime, we must be ever vigilant to ensure the safety of our families, team members, and each other. Among other things, our plans to celebrate the 50th anniversary by hosting a TCOM Pediatric Reunion had to be shelved. Fortunately, we were able to honor our twenty-five 2020 future pediatrician graduates with a virtual event on Thursday, June 4, at which Dr. Priya Bui was recognized as the TCOM Pediatric Teacher of the Year. COVID-19 Bright Spots for Pediatrics and Women's Health Teams During COVID-19 Pandemic

- 1. <u>Clinical Team</u>---develops telemedicine capabilities to meet patient needs; innovates drive up vaccine clinics in collaboration with Pediatric Mobile Clinic; looks out for those at risk by supervising student calls to check on status of patients and families.
- 2. <u>Academic Team</u>---launches innovative on-line and virtual interactive curriculum for core clerkship rotations; creates menu of Pediatric Directed Studies Electives for TCOM students whose in-person rotations canceled by COVID; continues to nurture interest in pediatrics through mentorship and student support.
- 3. <u>Research Team</u>---finds ways to remain productive and optimistic while working remotely; energetic collaboration, data analysis, grant and manuscript writing; supervision of graduate trainees and medical students; adapting Pediatric Research Program to a mentored virtual format; welcoming and support to new Faculty member, Leslie Allsopp PhD, who leads Asthma 411 Coalition.
- 4. <u>Engagement Team</u>---strives to keep PWH and its components connected; emphasis on communication, service to others, and ideas to celebrate our teamwork and collaboration.
- 5. <u>TCOM and PA Students</u>---adapting to the upheaval in their educational circumstances; making the most of learning opportunities including on-line programs and precious clinical encounters; volunteering in service to patients, fellow students, and community.

We remain very grateful to our partners in clinical education, near and far, for their continued commitment to our students' learning opportunities, even when interruptions due to the pandemic become necessary. Fortunately, interest in pediatric and women's health careers remain strong and we await with anticipation the results for TCOM 2021 students in the Residency Match that will be known to us on March 19. With a New Year coming soon, I anticipate that 2021 will be a year of hope and progress in our Dept. of PWH's continued mission to create solutions for a healthier community of children and families.

Two of our esteemed long-term pediatric professors, John Fling MD and John Podgore DO, will be retiring on December 31, 2020. It will also be a year of exciting transition for me, in retiring as Professor and Chair on March 31 after over 12 years in the position, and for Priya Bui DO in assuming the role of Interim Chair. She will provide inspired leadership for the future of TCOM PWH. We plan to have more timely updates to share with you in early 2021!

POPTALK! PODCAST

The idea for the PopTalk! Podcast came from my thought that a public version of grand rounds could be very important and helpful to our community, and a way for us to share health information in a straightforward and easy to understand way. We decided to shift the idea from a live in-person grand rounds, to a more accessible format. In late 2019, I, along with Dr. Raines-Milenkov and two third year students, Prachi Thapar and Sukanya Roy began the very first recording of "PopTalk!", with our technical and media expert Steve Bartolotta guiding us through the process. The podcast experienced a few hiccups when we started, including some awkward recording mishaps, but since then our audience has grown exponentially. Each episode examines a different health issue, from COVID-19 to Food insecurity, all diving into the health ramifications of each. To improve our content and to make sure our audience received the best information possible, each episode has brought in a guest speaker. When the BLM movement began, we put together a diverse panel of scientists and experts to dive into the effect of racism on health head-on. Our first live episode reached an audience of over 1700 people! With a vast variety of different issues affecting our community today, we have barely started to dive in. The PopTalk! Dr. Fling offered me a faculty position at the department of Pediatrics in 2008. At that time, I was one of the very few MDs in a DO school and was nervous to get into osteopathic culture. I love to be a part of the pediatric department, where providers and staff sincerely care for each other. 
