

INNOVATIVE RESEARCH IN ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE


- >> The Health and Aging Brain study examines how factors such as diabetes, physical condition, and lifestyle contribute to cognitive problems among Mexican-American seniors.



The Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine is the Nation's highest ranked osteopathic medical school for primary care, according to U.S. News & World Report.

- Specializing in primary care and prevention, healthy aging, and applied genetics.
- Only site in Texas selected for Department of Health and Human Services federal grant to improve health care for older adults.
- Pediatric Mobile Clinic brings primary care services to kids in under-served areas of Tarrant County.
- SaferCare Texas is a collaborative institute focused on patient safety and reducing medical errors.
- Only medical school in the world authorized by the Institute for Healthcare Improvement to provide training for the International Certification Professional in Patient Safety.
- The Center for Human Identification performs forensic DNA casework, identifies human remains, manages missing persons programs, and fights human trafficking.

COLLABORATION



46,934 Volunteer hours by students, faculty, and staff

- >> HSC team members played a key role in the community in response to the COVID-19 crisis: establishing a testing site for first responders and working in partnership with Tarrant County to conduct contact tracing and oversee a public information hotline.
- The UNT Center for Human Identification manages the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs) as a no-cost information clearinghouse and resource center for all missing, unidentified, and unclaimed person cases throughout the U.S.
- SaferCare Texas provides asthmamitigating medications to eleven public ISDs in underserved communities. Providing these medications results in fewer missed school days for the students and a cost savings of more than \$1 million for the schools.
- To prevent opioid overdose deaths in North Texas, HSC distributed 9,000 doses of Narcan and provided training for team and community members.
- The Mobile Vision Screening Program provides no-cost screenings to Fort Worth preschoolers.
